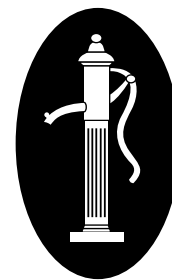

There are several points which we would like to bring to your attention:

- Members with “current” membership status are defined as those who have paid any current fee or subscription levied, and whose membership card and mug remain intact.

Epidemics in the 21st Century - The Lessons of SARS

Dr Mike Ryan will give the 11th annual John Snow Society Pumphandle lecture at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, Keppel Street, London, UK on the 22nd September.

Dr Ryan is the World Health Organization’s coordinator for global alert and response and was heavily involved in the global effort to stop the spread of severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS) virus earlier this year.

This highly topical lecture will consider how the outbreak of SARS was managed and its implications for the future.

The lecture will be followed by the customary visit to the John Snow public house on Broadwick Street, where the AGM will be held.

Pumphandle Lecture 2002

Managing vaccine adverse effects

On Monday 9th September 2002, Dr David Salisbury gave the 10th annual John Snow Society Pumphandle Lecture at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

The lecture focused on the public's concern for vaccine safety; where the fears come from and how the Department of Health tackles these problems. Dr Salisbury stressed that in

times of vaccine safety scares, positive responses from authoritative bodies are the key and it is essential to tell the truth and give clear messages.

JSS-Scandinavia was established in Kristiansund, Norway in 1998. Closely linked to the annual Scandinavian or Norwegian Drinking Water Conferences, the Scandinavian branch of the JSS focuses on drinking water safety and risk communication in connection to drinking water quality.

Every year a Pump Handle Award is presented to a person who has contributed to the safety of drinking water. On May 20th this year the Pump Handle was awarded to Toril Hofshagen during the Norwegian Drinking Water conference in Tromsø, north of the Arctic Circle.
